

NEP IS...

- Council-directed, City-Funded, Capital Improvements
 Program
- Provides RESIDENTS the opportunity to PROPOSE and SELECT enhancement projects for their individual neighborhood area
- \$5 Million BUDGET distributed among 14 designated neighborhood areas
- Area funds allocated based on the number of households in each Neighborhood Area
- Rotates through 14 Neighborhood areas over seven-year period – TWO AREAS per year (2015-2022)
- Program supported by multiple City departments –
 Community Development, Parks, Transportation, Utilities
- Currently 18 NEP projects in progress around the city in six neighborhood areas



NEP PROCESS


- City allocates \$\$ to Neighborhood Area
- Residents submit ideas for spending \$\$
- City staff review ideas & generate projects
- Residents select projects to receive \$\$
- City implements projects in 3-5 years



Neighborhood Enhancement Program Updates



The Neighborhood Enhancement Program (NEP) is a \$5 Million, city-funded. capital improvements program that allows residents to propose and select projects that improve their neighborhood's quality of

life and enhance its character. The program rotates: through the City's 14 NEP Neighborhood Areas, serving two areas each year. Since 2015, NEP has notated through the Eastgete/Fectoria, Cooper Mountain/ Lakemont, West Lake Sammamish, NE Bellevue, Bridle Trails, NW Bellevue, Downtown/BelRed, Lake Hills, Crossroads and Wilburton Neighborhood Areas.

NEP is coming to Woodridge area with \$161K for improvements!

A virtual Kickoff Meeting is planned for Wed. April 7 for Woodridge residents to learn how they can participate In the City's Neighborhood Enhancement Program online and via mail. RSVP to neighborhoodoutreach@ believuewa, gov to receive the Zoom meeting link.



Each Woodridge household will receive a return postage-paid NEP Project Request Form in the mail in early April. Residents are encouraged to use this form or the online project request form on the NEP website (www.tellevueWA.gow/nep) to submit as many NEP project requests as they like by May 19.

Exemples of past projects throughout city neighborhoods include art elements, crosswalk. improvements, trail connections, street lighting and streetscape improvements.

West Believue area NEP currently in scoping and review phase

City staff are in the process of evaluating and reviewing resident-submitted project ideas for the West Bellevue

Neighborhood Area to determine which eligible projects will appear on the final West Bellevue NEP



West Bellevue residents should watch for a mailed Voter's Pamphiet and ballot to arrive in early June, then vote for their top three project choices. Voting is by mail only and limited to one ballot per household. A virtual public Open House is planned for June during which projects on the ballot will be presented and residents can meet with city project managers in breakout rooms to discuss any questions they may have. Look for more details to come.

Be the driver that you went your teen to be by setting the enample:



PROJECT CRITERIA

AFFORDABILTY

PROJECT COSTS MUST NOT EXCEED THE FUNDING ALLOCATION FOR THE NEIGHBORHOOD AREA

CONSISTENCY

PROJECTS MUST BE CONSISTENT WITH CITY PLANS AND POLICIES

FEASIBILITY

PROJECTS MUST BE PRACTICAL AND ACHIEVABLE FOR THE CITY

IMPLEMENTATION

PROJECTS MUST BE DESIGNED AND CONSTRUCTED WITHIN 3-5 YEARS OF SELECTION

MAINTAINABILITY

PROJECTS MUST NOT REQUIRE MAINTENANCE THAT IS BURDOMESONE TO THE CITY

PUBLIC BENEFIT

PROJECTS MUST BE LOCATED ON PUBLIC PROPERTY, EASEMENTS, OR PROPERTY DESIGNATED FOR PUBLIC USE, AND MUST BENEFIT THE GENERAL PUBLIC
