## Bellevue Neighborhoods Forum A Dialogue with Our Muslim Neighbors

**Bellevue City Hall Council Chambers**

You're invited to join a conversation with our Muslim neighbors at city hall this month. The Neighborhoods Forums is a series designed to engage the community on pressing topics and provide a safe space for respectful civil discourse.

Since the tragic attacks in Paris and San Bernardino, homegrown terrorism and the war with ISIS have placed the issue of public safety and terrorism at the center of the news.

How has this national discussion impacted the Muslim community on the Eastside?

Come join an evening of conversation, where you will meet Eastside Muslim residents who will share their own thoughts and everyday experiences living here in Bellevue. The event is an opportunity to listen and ask questions of our Muslim neighbors in a safe, educational environment.

### Panelists will include:

Afshan Ejaz has lived on the eastside for ten years. She enjoys spending time outdoors with her two sons. Originally a petroleum engineer she is exploring a career change and is currently a student nurse.

Ahmed Azmy: Mr. Azmy has worked in the tech industry and is a local environmental advocate.

Ejaz Yusaf: Bismilla Ejaz and his wife, Nancy Yusaf, have been Bellevue residents since 1994, and have had four children grow

up in the Bellevue public school system. The couple own Zebra Printing, a business serving Bellevue and the Eastside for the past 28 years. Ejaz is a member of Muslim Community Association of Bellevue (MCAB) at the Islamic Center of the Eastside.

**Khizer Sheriff:** Mr. Sheriff is a member of Muslim Association of Puget Sound (MAPS) and The Muslim Community Resource Center (MCRC), a service organization led and managed by a group of community volunteers passionate about helping the less fortunate in our community.

**Shaiza Damji:** Ms. Damji is a member of the Ismaili Muslim community. She has served in various volunteer capacities with the Ismaili Council for the United States and for the Aga Khan Development Network which focuses on preservation and promotion of arts and culture, economic development, health and education in the U.S. and throughout the world.

**Shams Pirbhai:** Mr. Pirbhai, a Bellevue resident since 1979, owns International Foods Bazaar, a retail/wholesale Indian food business, and the International Foods Corner restaurant. He serves on the Elder Council for the Islamic Center on the Eastside and has raised four children in Bellevue.

## Cultural Conversations

# A window into one family's story of survival; immigration — then and now



Cultural Conversations is a program that was launched in 2010 as a partnership between diverse women in the community and the City of Bellevue. The women's group gather regularly to have "cultural conversations" to enhance their knowledge and understanding of different cultural practices and world views in a comfortable space and a nurturing environment. The meeting this month will feature a special guest speaker Cynthia Flash Hemphill. Cynthia is the author and editor of "A Hug from Afar", a book of long-lost letters narrating one family's dramatic journey of determination and perseverance through three continents to escape the Holocaust.

From the young age of 9 on the island of Rhodes (one of many small islands between Greece and the Turkish coast) Clara Barkey started writing to her uncle Ralph and auntie Rachel in the far-away place known as Seattle. This smart and determined young woman reported news of the relatives Ralph had left behind on Rhodes and the happenings of her \*Sephardic Jewish community. But what started as friendly letters quickly turned to desperate pleas for help as life for the Jews of Rhodes deteriorated under the control of Italian dictator Benito Mussolini, who allied with Adolph Hitler. Forgotten and never thought of again, Clara's letters turned up in Seattle more than 60 years after they were written. Preserved and translated from \*Ladino into English, they paint a vivid and detailed 16-year story of how one family triumphed and survived after they became refugees and rode the roller coaster of successes and failures to legally win permission to immigrate to the United States.

Join Clara's daughter, Cynthia Flash Hemphill and Clara's sister, Regina Amira, who will tell their family story and share excerpts of the letters Clara wrote as a young girl. Learn how the treasure of these letters being found was such a gift to their family

history. Recently published, "A Hug from Afar" leads you through the journey of exile, community annihilation, dashed hopes, and real-life drama seen through the eyes of a young woman forced to grow up too quickly as she desperately worked to save her family from Hitler's efforts to destroy the Jews. The story unfolds like a suspense novel, but is a true story of a family who immigrated to our own community.



Following the presentation, we will share our own stories and explore how the themes in Clara's story ring true today with the immigration struggles of survival and immigration around the globe. Participants may choose to share

their own stories in small groups — of fleeing a homeland to reach for safety, of how family ties, love and trust play into survival, and of how our own stories inform who we are today. Don't miss this special afternoon of storytelling, discussion, tea and refreshments. Women of all ages, faiths and cultures are welcome to attend. \**Sephardic*-The descendants of Jews expelled from Spain and Portugal in 1492. The word Sephardic comes from the Hebrew word for Spain, Sepharad.

\**Ladino*-The dying language of Sephardic Jews, based on Spanish and mixed with other languages found around the Mediterranean region.

## Eastgate/Factoryia Neighborhood Enhancement Program Update


Thank you to everyone who came to the Eastgate/Factoryia NEP Project Open House on February 10th! We received 85 requests during the solicitation of project ideas last fall, which we used to generate 26 projects for the NEP ballot.

The requests that we received included bike facilities, bus facilities, community spaces, community identity, parks, programming, public art, sidewalks, sports facilities, streetlights, traffic calming and trails. The requests that were not developed into proposed ballot items either did not meet the NEP criteria, were referred to other departments, or are being addressed by ongoing work programs. If your request was not developed into a proposed ballot item, you should have received an explanation letter from the NEP Coordinator, Emily Kish. If you did not receive a letter and have questions about your request, please feel free to contact Emily

During the first week of March, households in the Eastgate/Factoryia Neighborhood Area will receive mailed ballots requesting votes for the three projects that each household feels are most deserving of the \$293,000 NEP allocation. The votes are weighted by prioritization, with the first choice receiving three points, the second choice receiving two points, and the third choice receiving one point. Each ballot must include the household's address for validation and must be mailed to the city by March 24, 2016 to be counted. City staff will tally all of the votes and send a newsletter announcing the winning projects to Eastgate/Factoryia residents in late March/early April. The newsletter will also include an NEP evaluation form, so please be thinking of elements that you liked or disliked about the NEP process, as well as suggestions for improvement, as you complete this form.

We can't wait to see which projects will be funded and eagerly await your responses!


conflicts and differences? Through this 40-hour basic mediation training, the Bellevue Neighborhood Mediation Program, in collaboration with Bellevue College, will teach you the core skills you need to manage conflicts in your own personal and professional lives as well as tools to help others. This is the core training taught in all dispute resolution centers and is the first step to become a certified mediator.

Mediation is a process that encourages people in conflict to resolve their own disputes and shape their own agreements. It is often an alternative to other processes such as arbitration or litigation. The skills learned here are applicable for everyday life and relationships. Getting unstuck, having difficult conversations are everyday occurrences and

we can provide the tools needed to help you resolve them in a win-win way.

In this training you will learn to:

- apply the eight step model of mediation
  - understand the ways people approach conflict
  - listen skillfully and ask powerful questions
  - share perspectives, needs and feelings
  - identify what is really important to yourself and others
  - work out problems artfully
  - reach agreements that everyone can live by


### **Continental Breakfast and Keynote Speaker, Becky Henchman**
